



# Children's Hospital of Michigan Brachial Plexus Program

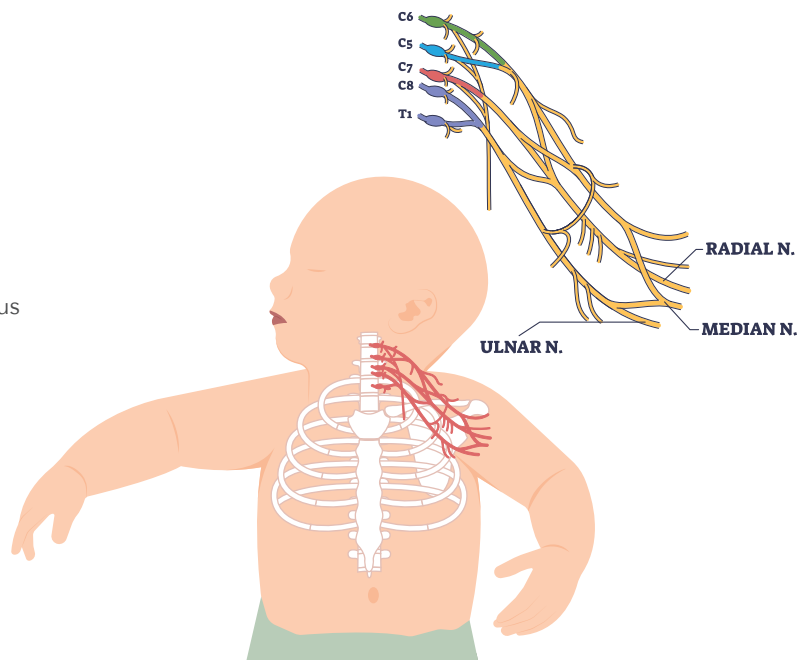
The Brachial Plexus program at Children's Hospital of Michigan is a multidisciplinary clinic focused on caring for infants and children with brachial plexus injuries. Early recognition and treatment is important to minimize complications and maximize function.

## What is the Brachial Plexus?

Brachial plexus is a group of nerves around the neck and shoulder. These nerves control muscle function in the chest, shoulder, arms, hands and fingers. A loss of movement or weakness of the arm may occur if these nerves are damaged. In many cases, the damaged nerves repair themselves with minimal treatment, however, a child with severe brachial plexus injury may need surgery to restore function in their arm.

Children's Hospital of Michigan Brachial Plexus program provides non-surgical and surgical treatments for infants and children with all degrees of severity of brachial plexus injuries and provides families with expert diagnosis, treatment, and care.

Bringing together a multidisciplinary team led by the Neurosurgery division and including specialists in Neurology, Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation and Occupational Therapy, allows for patients and families to be evaluated and advised comprehensively on the same day by all members of the care team.
